This is such an exciting experience for students as they prepare for careers in working with children and can apply college credit to their transcripts free of charge as they launch their college career. 



Hear how Almer's friends and family resolved to fix a system that ultimately allowed irresponsible food manufacturers to ship tainted peanut products nationwide, sickening more than 700 people and killing nine. Almer's story, work and compassion for doing what is right will keep you engaged and wanting to learn more.

Teacher Cadet Training Program

Dedication, enthusiasm and commitment are words to describe the group of Minnesota FACS Teachers that attended the 3 day Teacher Cadet Training at the Department of Education on June 28-30. An amazing 44 teachers, from all over the state, attended the South Carolina based training that was organized by our leader, Max Peterson. Max worked effortlessly to set-up this training which is a well-respected introduction to education and teaching programs for high school students in which FACS has the national standards and state frameworks and standard already aligned to support this initiative. The program is offered at high schools in 38 states, all over the country. The presenters, Anne Ledford and Angi Brush provided a thorough review of the Teacher Cadet curriculum, shared samples of student work and even guided the attendees through several scenarios and lessons.

Students seeking to enroll in a Teacher Cadet program have a high set of standards they need to meet before being accepted and while they are in the program. Upon completion of Teacher Cadet, students can earn six college credits to apply to their college of choice, free of charge. The trained FACS Teachers are taking the information back to their school districts to see how the program can be implemented.

A big thank you goes out to Max Peterson for all of her efforts in making this training possible! She is planning to set up another Teacher Cadet Training session next summer.

World Congress of the International Federation for Home Economics By Jean Knaak

I attended at the World Congress of the International Federation for Home Economics in Daejeon, Korea in August. It was a marvelous experience and included wonderful opening and closing ceremonies, keynoters, and a home visit with a Korean family. It was a joy to meet with home economists from around the world and to see how many concerns we jointly share.

The changing role of women in the workplace and in the family has been the theme of a number of presentations. There is a large amount of commonality from country to country. A surprise has been that living conditions and the economy

in Korea are far stronger than I expected, along with late marriages and very small family sizes.

At least ten times the 1988 World Congress for Home Economics that was held in Minneapolis has been mentioned favorably. Planners for the next United States conference have noted the detailed and excellent work of the local twin cities home economists in 1988, so many of you can feel complimented that all of your hard work was remembered.

This truly is an international conference with people from all continents. Some attendees, particularly those from Nigeria, wore national dress. They were clearly the winners of the greetings presented by various countries.

My first few days in Seoul, Korea, were spent at cooking schools and food museums prior to leaving by bullet train for Daejoen, Korea for six days. Those food experiences plus the food offerings here have been an education in themselves and my suitcase will be heavy with products to bring home. The use of vegetables in every imaginable way plus the many creative uses for rice were very interesting.
